Speaker Bios



HAIDER ALI

Haider Ali is currently an MA student at AKU-ISMC. He researches the history of state-making and de/anti-colonial resistance in the colonial and post-colonial periods focusing on the areas now under Pakistan-occupied Kashmir. He uses co-production to centre the perspective of social movements and subaltern subjects in his methodology. He has published reports on recent social movements in Gilgit-Baltistan for international websites and co-authored a chapter in the edited volume *Beyond the Mountains* (Raachi Press, 2024).



MOHSIN ALI BAIG

Mohsin Ali Baig is a GPISH scholar currently pursuing an MA in Islamic Studies and Humanities at the IIS. He holds a BA in International Relations and maintains a strong academic focus on peace and conflict studies, comparative religion, digital Islam, and identity politics. He previously served as a Research Intern at the Centre for Critical Peace Studies (CCPS). He has presented at national and international academic forums, including the First International Conference on Critical Peace Studies in Lahore. His recent publication in an HEC-recognized journal, "Deconstructing the Fable of Inclusive National Identity in Pakistan: An Account of Dwindling Kalasha Indigenous Identity in Chitral", critically examines the incentivized conversion and erasure of the Kalasha community's indigenous identity in Chitral, Pakistan.

His dissertation, titled "The Soviet Occupation of Afghanistan in 1979 and Its Socio-Religious and Political Implications on the Shi'a Imami Hazara Ismaili Muslims of Afghanistan" explores the historical and religious transformations triggered by foreign intervention. He is currently pursuing an MSc in Intellectual History at the University of Edinburgh, with a focus on intellectual traditions and political thought in Afghanistan from the late 19th to the 20th century. His research interests centre on Afghanistan's intellectual and political history, with a particular emphasis on Ismaili history and thought.

Prior to GPISH, Nazeer earned a BA in Political Economy from Kabul University in 2015 and an MA in Educational Leadership and Management from BRAC University in Dhaka, Bangladesh, in 2022.
